Prez Sez by Holly Carr

Several OHBIKE members expressed an interest in recruiting youth into OHBIKE. So, on October 8, I attended the Youth Bike Summit in Crystal City. People from different disciplines, backgrounds and ages gathered together to learn, share, network and explore how bicycling can be a catalyst for positive social change. It was hosted by Phoenix Bikes and sponsored by PeopleForBikes. As advertised, the event was truly inspirational.

There is a growing drive to integrate biking with educational and other youth needs, which is called, "Experiential Learning." Educators are finding that many kids learn more through bike skills. For example, they learn mechanical and technical skills by building their bikes; history, geography, reading, writing and public speaking. El Puente Academy for Peace and Justice (which is in Brooklyn, NY, and certified through the NYC public school system) offers GED training and workshops AND a 2-day ride on the C&O canal.



The ride on the C&O canal is a popular location for experiential learning in history, where youth learn about the Harpers Ferry Rebellion and how it might collate with current issues. The youth feel they learn more at El Puente than by sitting in school rooms.`

Triangle Bike Works, located in the North Carolina triangle, is a non-profit organization that leads cross-country bike tours based on historic places and events. The tours are designed to illuminate achievements made by people of color and develop confidence and leadership skills.

Here at home, we have Phoenix Bikes, which is in the Arlington Mill Community Center. As a 501(c), its mission is to educate youth, promote bicycling and build community. Phoenix Bikes is known for its "Build-A-Bike" and "Earn-A-Bike" programs. On Saturdays they offer a variety of rides including museum excursions,

trail and mountain bike opportunities. Phoenix Bikes has offered to visit us in Southern Maryland. Their web site may be found at www.phoenixbikes.org.

In addition, the National Park Service offers rides that start underneath the Woodrow Wilson Bridge at Jones Point Park. The people engaged in the summit were positive and inspiring. I think there is opportunity for OHBIKE to partner and synergize efforts with Phoenix Bikes, the National Park Service, and other organizations in the DC Metropolitan area, and I look forward to hearing your input and ideas.


